October, when temperatures cool down as we move past the long, warm and wonderful summer months we've enjoyed. Now we bring out the harvest theme decorations. Children think about pumpkins, jack-o-lanterns, costumes and candy.

In our church life two important celebrations are dominant this time of year. First is **Reformation** on October 26th. This Holy Day celebrates the work of the Holy Spirit to reform His Church at a time when it's teachings had gotten off-center. This was true regarding the teachings about how we are saved (**Justification** by **Grace** through **Faith**) and about the authority of the **Bible as God's Word** (the Bible is the "Norming Norm"). Two of the most influential leaders God used during the latter years of the sixteenth century and the early years of the seventeenth century were Martin Luther and John Calvin. It was not Luther's desire to see the Church split by the reform measures but that is what happened when the Church, led by Rome and the Pope, refused to listen to God's guidance through His reformers. So the institutional church splintered but the Gospel remained pure and the Word of God continued to clearly speak God's truth.

Today, within modern Lutheranism, the issue of the authority of the Bible is still on the front burner of our discussions and disagreements. It led to the split within Lutheranism that created the AALC. The position of the AALC is that the Bible is the inspired, inerrant, and infallible Word of God, a position in conformity with the old ALC. This high view of authority of the Bible directs how we think and act regarding our theology and our social issues, and our church polity. On this Sunday Pastor Tim will tell a story from the life of the reformer, Martin Luther.

The second important Holy Day is **All Saints Day** which we will celebrate on Sunday, November 2nd but it is really on November 1 and it is historically celebrated on the eve of that day, or October 31. It's name was foreshortened from "All Hallow's Eve" to "Halloween." It was originally a day when pagans celebrated the dead. Christians took it over and made it a day for God's saints to celebrate our victory (and the victory of our loved ones who have died) over sin, death and the devil. At Emmanuel we will hear a story of one of God's Saints whose life inspires us in a walk of daring faithfulness to God. We will then record the names of our loved ones who have gone on before us and, during the Prayers, we will read the names of the dearly departed and toll the bell for them, celebrating their victory in Christ over death. The names of these loved ones will be pasted on the walls of the fellowship hall as a "cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12:1) to remind us to walk faithfully with the Lord until we walk through the valley of the shadow of death.

You are invited to come and worship the Lord, to join in the celebration of the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives this great month of October.

How Can We Help our Community?

DID YOU KNOW ?????? One in 4 children in our community are at risk of hunger? That 850 pounds of food will provide 664 meals? That since the first of December 2013 Emmanuel has donated 1063 pounds of food and 17 pounds of non-food items to the Food Bank? That in one week alone the children who attended VBS at Emmanuel donated 125 pounds of food? That cold weather and holidays are coming and a greater need will exist to help our neighbors? Following are "suggested" food items:

1. Canned meats with proteins like spaghetti, and meatballs or stews.
2. Hot or cold cereals.
3. Boxed meals like Hamburger Helper.
4. Canned yams/sweet potatoes, green beans for holiday baskets.
5. Canned fruits and vegetables for everyday meals.
6. Peanut Butter or Jelly (12 oz size)
7. Canned meats (chicken, tuna, beef, Spam)
8. Sundries including toothpaste, toothbrushes, bar soap, shampoo, disposable razors.
9. Desserts in a box like cookie or cake mix, frostings and staples like flour or sugar.
10. Disposable Diapers and wipes.
11. Pet food for cats or dogs and cat litter.
12. Garden or Orchard fruits and vegetables.

“Mary Mitskevich knew there was one thing she was not getting for Christmas—a toy ! Mary grew up as one of five children of a pastor in Russia, and her family couldn't afford Christmas gifts other than a few practical items like clothing and toiletries. So she will never forget the day in 1998 when Samaritan's Purse delivered brightly wrapped shoeboxes from Operation Christmas Child to her church. The boxes were jam-packed with fun gifts and little treasures. “I used every item to its fullest,” Mary said. “I outgrew the gifts inside the box before too long, but I never outgrew the box.” Even today, now that she is married and living in Texas, Mary still uses that 16 year-old shoebox to store precious keepsakes. “I have had the opportunity to pack several shoeboxes myself for kids around the world, and I hope these boxes will bring just as much joy and love as I experienced through the ministry of Operation Christmas Child,” she said.

In Memory

On September 29, 2014 our member, Cecil “Mac” McConnell went to be with our Lord. Mac joined the church back when Pastor Crawford was at Emmanuel. They both shared the love of fishing. He had a long outstanding career in the U.S. Navy. He was once stationed at PSNS and after retiring as a Chief Petty Officer he brought his family back to Bremerton. “In the years following his retirement Cecil worked as a computer specialist for Naval Torpedo Station Keyport; the State of Washington and Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, retiring in 1985.



Cecil was an avid rifle and bow hunter and a life-long member of the NRA. In 1991 he opened the Kitsap Archery shop.”

1996 marked another chapter in Cecil’s life. He was elected to the Bremerton City Council He served four terms (16 years) working with three different elected mayors. Cecil gained the reputation of being a “straight shooter” on the council. He had a “no nonsense” approach to city government but never held a grudge. In 2009 Cecil served as mayor “pro tem” until Patty Lent was elected. If you attended Cecil’s memorial service it became quite clear that he was a supportive advocate for our local fire fighters and law enforcement. Bremerton will surely miss Cecil as well as Emmanuel members that knew him.

He is survived by his beloved wife, Mae, of 64 years; his son, Robert McConnell, his daughter , Miki and son-in-law, Jim Turowski and daughter Patricia and son-in-law, Ernie Maxon as well as three grandchildren.

The Story Behind the Hymn ————— “For All the Saints”

For All the Saints was published in 1864. It was one of William How’s greatest hymns. Pastor How was a bit of a rebel. He originally studied to be a lawyer but turned to the ministry. He was offered a Bishop’s position with the Anglican church but chose to serve the poor instead. He made this decision unknown to his family. He served as a country parson in 1851 near the Welsh border. During this time he was a prolific author writing nearly 60 hymns. In 1879 he moved to London and became an assistant Bishop. He refused to ride a private coach but preferred public transportation. How was recognized as a liberal following the trends of his day. He was know as a soul-winner and an evangelical hymnist.

In 1995 Emmanuel Lutheran was approaching it's 50 years since it's beginning. (December 1995–February 1996) Pastor Christiansen stated in his annual report “for fifty years, members of this church have been traveling, and today we continue the journey of faith. It’s time to go again, to start another fifty years. The Magi departed in a direction and made a decision. The same decision is open to us as we begin again our journey of faith.”

There were several big maintenance projects completed during 1995. These included retiling the floor in the Fellowship Hall. This was completed by several members of the congregation. They included Richard Boyce and Karl Kannitzer (Kay’s husband). The Sanctuary was re-lamped that year thanks to Karl Kannitzer and Pastor Gordon Christensen as well as several other members. Several men of the congregation also assisted with repainting the daycare. Karl helped with this as well. Also, Vern Pudas (Bonnie Mace’s dad, Mollie Erickson’s grandpa) helped with the repainting.

That year the Sunday School’s 3rd and 4th graders put together health kits for Lutheran World Relief. The teens served Easter Breakfast and went to Lutherhaven on Wednesday nights through the summer. An evening VBS was held in August. The upstairs teen room was painted. Larry Ficca helped with Sunday School and the teen program. Judy Armstrong served as the Parish Education and Youth chairperson. Thank you Judy for your continued service in our education program at Emmanuel. Judy continues to teach Sunday School, VBS and Women’s Bible Study.

In 1995 the music book we use today, “With One Voice”, was purchased. It added much to the worship services.

The Quilters were meeting bi-monthly. During the year they completed and sent 95 quilts to Lutheran World Relief. They also put together and sent layettes. The Altar Guild was an active group at that time. Carol Henning served as the Chairman and Sylvia Boyce served as the Co-Chairman. Thank you ladies for your continued service.

That year was a tough one for Emmanuel 12 of their members went to be with the Lord in one year. However, they celebrated 5 weddings in the same year.
