We expected Andrew, at six months old, would enjoy the wrapping paper and empty boxes more than the gifts.

Christmas 2021. This will be my last Christmas Eve as a pastor, and as pastor of Emmanuel Lutheran Church. You, the people of God at Emmanuel, have loved me and supported me and I am profoundly grateful to you. We have four adult children and ten grandchildren. They have electronic "toys" that were not invented when their parents were children. I haven't sung in Norwegian anymore, my parents have passed into glory. My greatest sorrow is that my beloved wife, Carolyn, after suffering a pulmonary embolism, also passed on into glory. She was unwavering in her love for our family and for me. She held our extended family together. We had planned a quiet and intimate retirement, sitting side by side in our recliners. Now I miss her every day. I'm grateful for my siblings. I talk regularly with Joyce, my sister-in-law, and that helps me feel connected to others.

I'm pleased the Lord has led Pastor Rob Stroud to Emmanuel. He and Delores will be a blessing to us and I'm sure we can be a blessing to them. I plan to continue my membership at Emmanuel.

Dear People of God, I thank you for the privilege of being your pastor for the past decade. You are doing great work to the glory of God and I am proud of you. Well done, Saints of God! Now I'll join you in the pews.

Welcome Pastor Rob

Pastor Rob Stroud was born in California, but his mother was from a pioneer family in Poulsbo. Because of those ties, he eventually moved back to Kitsap County, where he graduated from North Kitsap High School, Shoreline Community College and the University of Washington.

Hearing God's call to pastoral ministry, he attended Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. His vicarage was in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and following his senior year at Luther, he was ordained as an American Lutheran Church pastor at his home congregation, First Lutheran in Poulsbo.

Pastor Rob served for more than five years as the pastor of an ALC church in Sacramento, California. At that time, he accepted a call from the ALC to become an active duty chaplain in the United States Air Force.

His USAF career took him to 11 assignments, all around the globe. He received numerous military decorations, including two Joint Service medals and one each from the Army and the Navy. After retirement from active duty, he moved to Seabeck and continued serving the church at District and National level. In addition to preaching in many local congregations, he has served as an Interim Pastor three times.

While on active duty, Pastor Rob went through the colloquy process to become a pastor in the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, with which our AALC is in full fellowship.

Pastor Rob is a strong believer in the importance of education and following his ordination he continued his studies. He earned a Master of Theology degree in Patristics (early Church history) and a Doctor of Ministry degree in Military Chaplaincy.

Rob and Delores married in 1976 and she has been his faithful partner in all of his ministries. Delores retired several years ago after teaching Special Education the past decade at Kingston High School. She remains active as a volunteer in a variety of ministries. They have three children and ten grand-children—all of whom love Jesus.

PART FIFTEEN—The Monticello Porch

Minnie Pierce was born in Canada in 1871. A "Shouting Methodist". Committed to the Salvation Arm, she became a child bride at 15 to 48 year old James Kennedy. In 1890 she gave birth to a baby girl who she name Aimee Elizabeth, who would in the 1920's cause a sensation in America as the Evangelist Aimee Semple McPherson. At age 17, Aimee married



a preacher named Robert Semple. They served a year in China as Missionaries. They then toured as itinerant Evangelists, preaching in exotic places such as Dayton, WA. Minnie, Aimee's mother, also undertook Missionary work in Portland and Seattle, Longview, Kelso and other Puget Sound cities. Her "Official" headquarters was the Monticello hotel in Longview, where she often rode her white horse "Billy Sunday" across the

The Liturgy and ELC

front porch.

The liturgy is basically, "The order of events". A common definition is, "The ritual for various forms of public worship in churches." For Lutherans, the Liturgy is a communal response to and participation in the sacred thought. The Liturgy is about God and His work. The purpose of the Liturgy is to give glory and honor to God. To build up the faith of the people and instruct the faithful. The Christian Liturgy is the response of faith and love to the "spiritual" blessings with which the Father constantly enriches us. Biblical references which supports the Liturgical form of worship are: Mat 28:19; Acts 2:42; Act 10:9; Acts 20:7; and Rom 10:17; 1 Cor 11:3-161; Cor 14:26-40 and 1 Tim 4:16.

Not all Christian Churches practice the Liturgy. Those that do are referred to as Liturgical Churches or simply congregations that participate in a Liturgical worship service. Typically these types of congregations follow a ritualistic form of service based on the teachings of Jesus Christ and the practices and instructions of the Disciples as led by the Holy Spirit.

My mother's family were catholic (a Liturgical Church). I was baptized in a Catholic Church and declared my religious preference on my dog tags as Catholic. However, my father's people tended to be protestant and my favorite aunt with whom I spent a great deal of time was a Pentecostal. When visiting my aunt I attended services in her church. While I always thought of Church as a place of ritual and incense, there were some things about my aunts church that appealed to me. Those things were praise songs and the feeling of love for the Lord and for one another. However, I could not ignore the value to me of worshipping in the Liturgical (Catholic) Church. Over my early years, I tried other churches until I one Sunday, walked into a Lutheran Church (ALC). Here was my answer, where God was leading me. This was exactly what I had been looking for.

However, after a period of mergers and questionable Synod leadership, I found myself in a Church that accepted the concept that the Bible was not necessarily the actual Word of God. And now, here I was back where I started looking for a Church that was Liturgical, loved the Lord and one another, believed the Bible was "exactly" the Word of God, and included "praise songs" into their Worship Service. He had led me to Emmanuel Lutheran Church (AALC), Thanks be to God. As I look around in the Sanctuary every Sunday, I see others who have made the same journey. We are all brothers and sisters in Christ.


