Pastor's Message

This past Lenten season we took time at our weekly "Lenten Soup Luncheons" and we studied the Apostle's Creed from the Small Catechism. In this month's newsletter, I hope to highlight a portion of those studies and time. Based on the Third Article of the Apostle's Creed, we learned about Jesus' love and sacrifice in going to the cross to take away our sins. We discussed our own deep need for, and yet, inability to earn this righteousness ourselves; in what only God could grant us through faith in Christ Jesus, He does so, by the power of His Holy Spirit. We call this both, "salvation" and in God's continued work in our lives and hearts through the Holy Spirit, "Sanctification".

No, we were not planning on skipping past the trial, suffering, agony and crucifixion of Christ. That was and is the greatest testimony of His love and valuation of all those for whom He came, took on human flesh, suffered and died to save those who believe in Him; and the blood He shed to take away our sins. In the faith-life of Emmanuel Lutheran Church, we hope to see in God's Holy Word and the confidence we share in the confession of our faith according to that Word, that The Easter Season and The Third Article of the Apostles Creed share God's work (not our own) "To Make Holy". As we studied through the Apostle's Creed during our Lenten Soup luncheons, it was clear that God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit; called us by the Gospel, enlightened us with His gifts, sanctified and kept us in one the true faith, "and will at the Last Day raise up me and all the dead, and give unto me and all believers in Christ eternal life. This is most certainly true." (Small Catechism, page 123*)

THE THIRD ARTICLE SANCTIFICATION

I believe in the Holy Ghost; the holy Christian Church, the communion of saints; the forgiveness of sins; the resurrection of the body; and the life everlasting. Amen.

Note: In the margins of the Small Catechism we were using for our Lenten studies of the Apostle's Creed, next to the title of **"The Third Article"**, a simple note, by a Confirmand, was:

"TO MAKE HOLY".

The confirmation student, and now others who share this book and see the note, are called to remember this point: God, and He alone can, and has done, what is needed;

TO MAKE HOLY, those believing upon Him.

When asked, "What does this mean?" The small catechism says that, "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Ghost has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith; Even as He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian Church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith; in which Christian Church He daily and richly forgives all sins to me and all believers, and will at the Last Day raise up me and all the dead, and give unto me and all believers in Christ eternal life. This is most certainly

true."

Luther and Lutherans—Part Six

Gunfight at the Worms corral. Confronted by the Pope's tribunal, Luther responds with, "If I am in error, I will be the first to throw my books into the fire, otherwise, here I stand. I can do no other. God help me." There isn't a historian who could argue against the idea that Luther's stand at Worms was one of the most significant moments in history, including the signing of the Magna Carta or the landing of Columbus in the New World in 1492. To Luther, when the scripture said one thing and the Church said another, he had no choice but to go with what the scripture (the word of God) said. Luther was not trying to destroy the Church, he was trying to call the Church back to its true roots, to a biblical idea of a merciful God. He was not asserting the freedom of the individual to do as he pleased. He was asserting the freedom of the individual to do a God pleased. Luther was actually asserting the modern idea of freedom of religion. The Church officials at Worms were not listening, at least, not with their

hearts. To them, Luther was a heretic and needed to be burned at the stake. Realizing the truth and the futility of trying to "do the right thing," Luther with the help of Frederich the Wise, managed to flee and go into hiding at Wartburg where he began his great work of translating the New Testament. But that's not all that came out of that little room in exile at Wartburg.

Woke

WOKEShouldn't it be "wake," as in wake up? "Woke" is used by both liberals and conservatives as a political or social issue. It is actually, a term referring to those who care about racial intolerance and social injustice. But, this term is only one for which understanding and use is "lost in the shuffle." For example, a word we do not ever use anymore is "evil". We no longer use it to describe psychopath, criminals and other scary people. Instead, we use words like "unacceptable" behavior. Or, he/she had a bad childhood or was abused by the system. We are obviously, afraid we may be accused of being judgmental if we use the word "evil" to describe a person's behavior. So we come up with a softer, more acceptable word. Or we re-define it altogether. Even in the Bible (Isaiah 5:20) there was a time when evil was actually called good. Over time, we have re-defined our standards of morality. Satan, by interjecting his influence over us is gaining ground at a very rapid pace. We need to



re-establish the term "evil" and deal with it as our Lord has instructed us.

There are three ways to deal with evil: (1) Realize and accept "evil" for what it is (2) Accept that it cannot be overcome by any individual alone-it must be overcome through prayer and help of God and (3) We must courageously hold the line and "call a spade a spade."

The Story Behind the Lenten Hymn...."Beneath the Cross of Jesus"

We are all familiar with this old, well-known Lenten hymn but do you know how the lyrics to this hymn came about? The author of this hymn is a woman named Elizabeth Clephane. Elizabeth was born in Edinburgh. Her father was sheriff of Fife. She is described by one of her siblings as "a very quiet child, shrinking from notice and was always absorbed in books. The loss of both her parents at an early age taught her sorrow. As she grew up she was recognized as the cleverest one of our family. She was the first in her class and a favorite at school. Her love for poetry was a passion. Among the sick and suffering she won the name, "My Sunbeam." Within the lyrics you can hear her own description of her nickname. "I take, O Cross, thy shadow for my abiding place:/I ask no other sunshine than the sunshine of His face."

Elizabeth and her family eventually moved to Melrose where she remained the rest of her life. Elizabeth was quite the Bible scholar and there was a soft spot in her heart for the poor and less fortunate. At one point she and her sisters sold their horse and carriage to help a family in need.

Elizabeth published poems in a Scottish magazine titled, *The Family Treasury*. Beneath the Cross of Jesus was not published until after her death.

The original tune for this hymn was written by Sankey but was replaced with the tune we are familiar with. The music we use was composed by Frederick C. Maker.
