Pastor's Message

"O give thanks to the Lord, for He is good and His mercies endure forever" (Psalm 136:1).

I come from a close knit family. Although we live in different cities we gather several times a year and Thanksgiving is one of those times. The family table is stretched, a fitted sheet of plywood is added and we seat over twenty people around it. There may be thirty or so who gather, so more tables are added in the living room. The tables are beautifully set with the best china, including handmade name tags for each place setting. The food, brought by many, fills the house with delicious aromas and warm memories of Thanksgiving meals past. The conversation and laughter fill our hearts with joy and thankfulness. It is a wonderful gathering and I thank God for the rich gift He has given to us. Before we sit, while we are standing around the table, we turn our hearts to God singing a song of thanksgiving to God who has filled our lives with His riches.

Our lives are also enriched when we gather in God's House for Thanksgiving Eve Worship. Turning to God in the assembly of the faithful opens our hearts to the One who is greater than we are, to the One who is beyond us, to the One who is our Creator and Redeemer. He is due our gratitude for His mercies and His love which He richly bestows upon us in Christ.

Emmanuel will sponsor our traditional Thanksgiving Eve Service on November 27 at 6:30 pm. Included in this service are the great songs of thanksgiving that we offer to God as well as an opportunity to share with one another why we are thankful and how we may be celebrating Thanksgiving this year.

This will be my second Thanksgiving without my bride, Carolyn. There is a deep sadness in my heart. I deal with this loss by recalling and clinging to the hope of everlasting life that Jesus Christ offers us. This separation will only last a few years until we too enter eternity and are united with our loved ones. In my mind I see Carolyn's chair and her place setting at the table. I imagine her at my side, our elbows bumping as we smile at each other and decide who gets the first bite.

The Advent-Christmas Decorating Party is Saturday, November 30, at ten a.m. We will decorate God's House to honor Him and to inspire us in our Worship. Advent, meaning "coming," refers to God's coming into this world, as the Babe of Bethlehem, the Savior, and as the King who brings God's rule. It is a time to prepare our hearts for His coming to us.

May the richness of these seasons fill your lives with God's joyful presence.

Vicar's Message

Advent and You

Over the Advent season, Emmanuel Lutheran Church will be having Matins prayer services, every Saturday at 9:30 in the morning. Initially, this kind of service was held at dawn in the Western monasteries where it was invented ("Matins" means "of the morning"), but I believe that a nice, restful wakeup before the service helps us to concentrate more on the meaning of the season. And what is that meaning? Watchfulness and hope!

During the period of Advent, we await the coming of Jesus in much the same way as our forebears in ancient Judah. In the time of struggle and uncertainty, the children of Israel were promised a Messiah, our deliverer. The Prophets gave the Old Testament saints a Gospel, which said that God's new Covenant would be ushered in by this Anointed one, with His law written on their hearts and all their sins forgiven (Jeremiah 31:33). This Savior would come to bring harmony and reconciliation before our Lord in a way that no ordinary man could achieve. In the cold and dark night of Israel under the Mosaic Law, the Lord swore to us that there would be a morning where we could feel the warmth of His love.

We live in that morning, the Eighth Day as Lutheran theologians call it, living with the joyful knowledge that our sins are forgiven and we have an eternal home with God. We have faith that the Father sent us the Messiah, His Son, just as He promised, winning that great reconciliation for us by His blood. With them we can pray with confidence,

"The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, His mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning."

– Jeremiah 3:22-23.

Yet just like the Old Testament saints, we have our own troubles. Temptations are everywhere and the Church is still being persecuted all over the world. We struggle with financial hardship, health problems, political strife, and familial pain. And we also know that we cannot deliver ourselves from the harshness of this world. We too look for the day when Jesus returns to us, "with a cry of command, with the voice of an archangel, and with the sound of the trumpet of God" (1Thessalonians 4:16). We look for the same hope, the same Messiah, and with the same diligence. This is the meaning of Advent; we celebrate that God kept His promise at Christmas, and look forward with diligent hope to the fulfillment of the next Promise – when Jesus comes back (Acts 1:10-11).

When the Israelites celebrated Passover of the festival of lights, there were often all-night vigils kept, to wait for the Lord's deliverance. This year at Advent, we rejoice to be watchful in the morning with Matins services, remembering that our Lord who has saved our souls will deliver us from the hardships the Church faces today. It will be quiet, without music accompanying, to remember that we wait with baited breath for Christ's return, but peaceful, knowing that our salvation has already been won. After each service I will be available to any brother or sister who comes for private prayer, to express our longings and anxieties before our God, who promises to hear us in all our struggles. Let us take all these to the Lord in prayer, and rejoice at the coming Day of redemption!


